The shredding vendor is a professional, commercial vehicle equipped with a high grade shredding device and a monitoring camera, which allows you to view your confidential documents as they are being shredded and processed. All shredding material will then be taken to an environmentally safe location for proper disposal & recycling.

Did you miss the shred day on November 2nd? If so here's another chance along with a recycling event



The City of Fort Worth will host its largest annual recycling event (rain or shine) for Fort Worth residents Saturday, Nov. 16, 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., at LaGrave Field, 301 N.E. Sixth St.

The free event, held in conjunction with America Recycles Day, allows residents to drop off documents for shredding and tires, batteries, light bulbs and electronics. Proof of residence, such as a driver's license or water bill, is required. No business waste will be accepted. Bridgestone Firestone, Goodwill Industries, Lighting Resources Texas and Waste Management are partners of the event.

The event formerly focused exclusively on documents for shredding. Last year's event, however, was expanded to include other recyclables with great success. More than 1,300 cars passed through the event and dropped off nearly 62,000 pounds of paper and 300 tires. At the busiest times, residents were through the drop-off lines in only 10 minutes.

This year, residents can drop off up to five boxes of documents, at a maximum 40 pounds per box. Waste Management will issue a "certificate of destruction" for the paper and then will recycle the shredded remains.

Bridgestone Firestone will collect up to four passenger tires per household. All residential bulbs and batteries are accepted.

Goodwill is accepting working and nonworking electronics, small appliances, household items, furniture and clothing.

A recent city audit found that nearly 30 percent of material taken to the city landfill is acceptable in the blue recycling carts, said Kim Mote, the city's assistant code compliance director. "Simply stated, we're tossing far too many recyclable materials into the brown garbage carts that end up being buried in the landfill forever," Mote said.

Scammers Impersonate Police with Spoofed Caller ID

Con artists are taking advantage of caller ID spoofing technology to pose as local sheriff's offices. They are calling residents and demanding they pay nonexistent fines.

How the Scam Works:

The phone rings. Caller ID says the number is the local sheriff's office, so you answer. The "sheriff" tells you there's a warrant out for your arrest. But you can pay a fine in order to avoid criminal charges. Of course, these "police" don't take credit cards; only a money order or pre-paid debit card will do.

What's going on here? Scammers are using a computer program that changes the number recipients see on their caller ID. This is known as spoofing. The scam is popping up all around the country, with scammers spoofing different numbers depending on the victim's location.

Victims have reported that scammers' trickery doesn't end with faking a phone number. Some reports say that scammers used the names of specific local police officers. Others said the con artists had personal information about the victims. For example, one De-triot-area woman fell for the scam when callers knew about a recent loan she had taken out.

What to Do if the "Sheriff" Calls:

- **Don't wire any money.** The police will not ask for payment over the phone, especially by money order or prepaid debit card.
- **Just hang up and don't call back.** It is tempting to get the last word, but you may end up giving scammers information they can use later.
- Call the real police and tell them what happened. If you were targeted, so were others in your area. Help the local authorities get the word out about the scam.
- **Never give out your personal information.** Caller ID spoofing makes it very easy for callers to pretend to be someone else. Scammers have also posed as immigration authorities and representatives of utilities companies. Just be very skeptical of anyone who calls asking for money or personal information.

Don't be Fooled by Do Not Call Registry Scam

It's back! Scammers are again making phone calls posing as representatives of the National Do Not Call Registry. The callers claim to provide an opportunity to register your phone number, but it's a trick.

How the Scam Works:

Someone calls you claiming to represent the FTC's <u>National Do Not Call Registry</u> or <u>Canada's National Do Not Call List</u>. The "representative" says he is offering you the chance to register your phone number in order to limit telemarketing calls. Several versions of this exist. In one, scammers ask for personal information, such as your name, address and Social Security number. In another, scammers try to charge a fee to join the registry.

Either way, just hang up the phone. The call is a scam. The registry is a free service, and sharing personal information with the caller will put you at risk for identity theft.

How to Protect Yourself from Do Not Call Registry Scams:

- You never need to pay. National Do Not Call Registry is a free service of the federal government.
- **Don't share your personal information** if someone calls you claiming to represent the National Do Not Call Registry.
- **Private businesses cannot register phone numbers**. Consumers may register directly, or through some state governments, but never through private companies. If someone claims otherwise, it's a scam.
- Remember that your participation in the National Do Not Call Registry does not expire.
- To add your number to the Do Not Call Registry, go to <u>Donotcall.gov</u> or call 888-382-1222 from the phone you wish to register. If you want to verify your number, use <u>this feature on the registry's website</u>.
- Canadians have their own National Do Not Call List. Register for that here.

Robocalls Likely to Increase as the Holidays Approach

The seemingly unrelenting amount of robocalls Americans receive are on the rise and with the holidays approaching, there doesn't seem to be any end in sight. Robocalling or "phone spamming" has a history of increasing during different times of the year and the end-of-the-year holidays are one of the peak seasons.

The National Do Not Call Registry currently has more than 217 million registered phone numbers. The Federal Trade Commission accepts complaints from consumers who receive unwanted calls while on the list and will investigate and fine companies that do not comply with the law. However, robocalls are becoming cheaper and easier than ever for scammers to create and send, making it more difficult for authorities to investigate. Callers can use automated dialers to place thousands of phone calls to random phone numbers at the same time.

Your BBB has some information on how to avoid being a victim of a phone scam:

- -Don't speak or press any buttons and just hang up the phone! Pressing buttons or saying yes will just alert the caller that they have reached a working number. This may subject you to even more robocalls in the future. Always screen your calls.
- -Never give out your bank card, credit card information, or social security number to an unidentified person or company over the phone. Verify who is contacting you.
- -If a live person happens to be on the line, ask for the company's physical location. A legitimate company will provide you with this information. If the representative refuses to give you the address, it is most likely a scam.
- -Register your phone number with the National Do Not Call list at www.donotcall.gov.

Keep in mind that even if your number is on the national registry, charities, political organizations, telephone surveyors and debt collectors may continue to call you.

With the holiday's approaching, consumers should be aware of potential fraudulent charities and continued phone scams pertaining to medical alert systems and the Affordable Healthcare Act. For more information on robocalls, visit bbb.org.





Persons wanting to become a member of the Citizen On Patrol (COP) program must meet the following criteria;

- 1. Be at least 18 years of age.
- 2. Submit a COP application prior to the 8 hour COP training course.
- 3. Pass a background check.
- 4. Attend and complete the 8 hour COP training course.
- 5. Sit with a FWPD Communications call-taker and dispatcher (one hour each).
- 6. Ride in with a FWPD Patrol Officer for a total of a full patrol shift (one 10 hour shift or two 5 hour shifts).
- 7. Ride in with an experienced COP member.
